

INZ ROUNDUP: JANUARY - FEBRUARY 2024

KEY UPDATES

27 FEBRUARY 2024

> An independent external review into the Accredited Employer Work Visa (AEWV) has been released by Te Kawa Mataaho Public Service Commission. The review makes four main findings, which are listed on our website, as well as ten specific recommendations. MBIE accepts the findings and recommendations of the review.

22 FEBRUARY 2024

- > Wage thresholds for the Skilled Migrant Category, the Green List Straight to Residence and Work to Residence visas, and the Parent Category residence class visa will increase in line with the median wage (NZD\$31.61 an hour) on 28 February 2024. The wage threshold for the Transport Sector Work to Residence Visa will also increase in line with the new median wage (excluding bus drivers).
- > This increase does not apply to the AEWV, which the <u>Government signaled</u> in December will <u>remain at the current rate of NZD\$29.66 an hour</u>. All sector agreements and exemptions to the median wage will also remain in place with current wage rates until further decisions are taken on the use of the median wage under the AEWV. The expiry of the tourism and hospitality wage exemption and the transport sector agreement have been delayed.

21 FEBRUARY 2024

> The New Zealand minimum wage will increase on 1 April 2024. This means that the wage threshold for all Recognised Seasonal Employer (RSE) workers will also <u>increase to align with the new minimum wage</u>. RSE workers must be paid at the New Zealand minimum wage plus 10%. This means that from 1 April 2024, employers in this sector must pay workers NZD\$25.47 per hour to ensure that RSE remuneration continues to increase in line with the minimum wage.

19 FEBRUARY 2024

> As at 16 February 2024 INZ has approved 108,938 AEWV applications, and 32,775 employer accreditation applications. Post-accreditation checks can occur at any time. As at 16 February 2024, INZ has undertaken 2,712 post-accreditation checks and an additional 596 are underway. We aim to check about 16% of accredited employers each year. The 16% of post-accreditation checks we undertake is a combination of random selection and targeted checks on a sample of all accredited employer types in addition to checks on all franchisee and controlling third party business models and any businesses that have been referred to us through a complaint or issue raised.

15 FEBRUARY 2024

- > Immigration New Zealand has <u>improved the process for deciding student visa applications by</u> giving our staff more efficient assessment tools and letter templates. This means we can process student visa applications faster, and let applicants know the outcome of their application sooner.
- > While managing this higher volume, we've also seen an increase in complex applications needing more time. To ensure your application can be assessed in a timely manner, please ensure your application includes all necessary information.

14 FEBRUARY 2024

> Senior Investigator Helen Garratt says immigration scams are nothing new but with the rise of social media including apps like WhatsApp it is easy for people to get pulled into a scam. INZ's advice for people who wish to work in New Zealand is to apply through approved pathways rather than via third party agents using apps. Any person providing New Zealand immigration advice, anywhere in the world, must be licensed by the IAA or be exempt. The "Guide to licensed immigration advisers" has more information and is available in multiple languages, including Hindi, Punjabi, Chinese, Korean, Samoan, Tongan and Taglish.

25 JANUARY 2024

> The 2024 reopening dates for capped Working Holiday Schemes (WHS) have now been confirmed. This <u>table</u> outlines the date each scheme will open, as well as how many places are available in each scheme for 2024. Once each scheme opens, applications will be open until the quota is filled. Once the quota is filled, the scheme will close until 2025.

Working holiday schemes that still have places left from 2023 will remain open until the quota is reached. The quota will then reset on the 2024 opening date.

21 DECEMBER 2023

- > The Worker Protection (Migrant and Other Employees) Act 2023 came into effect on 6 January 2024. The Act introduces a suite of <u>changes</u> across the Employment Relations Act, the Immigration Act, and the Companies Act, to combat migrant exploitation.
- > The Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment (MBIE) will not commence issuing infringement notices until changes to the immigration regulations have been made to prescribe the form of the infringement notice. This is subject to decisions by the new government. Once the amended immigration regulations are in place to enable the issuing of infringement notices, MBIE will be able to issue them for offending that occurred before the regulations were in place (up to a max of 90 days previously.
- > In most cases, the new infringement offences do not change employers' obligations. The power to publish the names of non-compliant employers alongside a "stand-down" period, during which they are not able to support further visa applications has also not begun. The offences that will lead to a stand-down and the formula for calculating a stand-down period are still to be approved by the government.

KEY STATISTICS

Statistics about visa application processing and decisions for some of INZ's key visa categories are listed below, and are correct as at **21 February 2024** unless otherwise stated. Processing timeframes are based on applications decided in January 2024, unless otherwise stated.

AEWV

- > INZ has received 34,815 employer accreditation applications since applications opened on 23 May 2022.
- > Job Check applications opened on 20 June 2022. INZ has received 64,384 applications, equating to 288,550 jobs. Of those, 62,120 Job Check applications have been approved, equating to 275,301 jobs.
- > INZ has received 121,001 work visa applications and approved 109,605 since applications opened on 4 July 2022.

- > Our website contains current processing estimates for all three AEWV gateways, with 80% of applications being processed within the stated timeframes.

VISITOR AND STUDENT VISA

- Since visitor visa applications opened to visitors offshore on 31 July 2022, INZ has received 753,427 applications. 80% of visitor visa applications are processed within 4 weeks. This timeframe is for all the visitor visa types INZ is processing. To see the timeframes for a specific visa, search for a visa.
- > Since 31 July 2022, INZ has received 97,254 international student visa applications. Visa processing times for international students can be found on our website. 80% of applications are processed within 9 weeks.
